ACWW Report May 2020

Associated Country Women of the World (ACWW)

In 1929 ACWW was formed by Madge Watts and Lady Aberdeen, who had earlier formed the WI. The first meeting was held in the Montefiore Hall in London, while the first Triennial Meeting was held in Vienna in 1933. During this time the NFWI passed a resolution pledging that the Women's Institute would support this worldwide organisation and would help fund it through Pennies for Friendship (the collection of members' loose change at their meetings). The main countries involved were from the British Commonwealth and were linked to the League of Nations, which later became the United Nations Foundation (UN).

There have been many changes since then, but through the WI and ACWW's participation, women have an important voice at the UN which is much appreciated. Earlier this year I asked members to support the UN Commission on the Status of Women, representing 11.95 Million women. Your WI should receive the newsletters from the World and the European Presidents to help keep you up to date. Recently I asked Diane Towndrow, our Secretary, to forward you information from Headquarters which included the link to the ACWW magazine (The Countrywoman) and a Coronavirus Survey.

Sadly, the lockdown has meant that several events were postponed or cancelled. The European Meeting scheduled for this year is now to take place in Glasgow next May and 'Women Walk the World' (normally on 29 April each year) will coincide with the International Day of Rural Women on 15 October next. Another date to consider is World Day Against Human Trafficking on 30 July – which is also International Friendship Day. All of these can be found on line. Please support WI Pennies for Friendship which goes to fund ACWW Projects that support women and families in the struggle for a better life.


