

CLIMATE CHANGE: WE CAN MAKE A REAL DIFFERENCE!

FOOD WASTE

One of the major factors in helping reduce the impact on Climate Change is cutting down on food waste. I was surprised to learn that this is such a major factor until I read the details of



plastic packaging, pollution caused by transporting food and then of course the waste. Oh what can we do?

We can decide not to buy anything that is wrapped or boxed in plastic (I shall miss my soft fruits!) that also means that we won't be buying out of season items that have been flown in from abroad.

Then we do things our Mums taught us like planning meals so that we don't waste food. Hopefully our sons and daughters will have learned from us and have taught their children but no harm in us encouraging them to think before they cook! We could probably be better at taking notice of sell by and use by labels too: **Sell By** being for guidance and **Use By** being the date to definitely use it. And storage is important to ensure the food is fit to eat.

I Know All This I hear you say but does the next generation that we are trying desperately to save our planet for? There's no harm in checking. Lockdown has brought about a cooking frenzy! A survey showed that 37% of people are increasingly making random dishes from things they have forgotten all about! AMBASSADORS ZOOM IN!!

Over 100 Climate Ambassadors from across the country met online for the first time in a meeting

Chaired by Ann Jones NFWI Chair of Public Affairs, Lyn Stubbings Chair of NFWI was also present. Emma Holland-Lindsay Head of Public Affairs made an excellent and detailed presentation on the activities in the year so far. NFWI are working with the Climate Change Just Transition initiative: a global project which aims to develop ways of working more effectively and in line with combatting Climate Change. Currently in the early stages this project is being launched in Yorkshire. This is certainly something to watch for!

Public Affairs are also continuing to work closely with Friends of the Earth on Plastic Soup. Emma was horrified to learn that the PPE plastic protection was being incinerated and not able to be reused. A Fixing Fast Fashion Toolkit is being developed – more on that later. Parliament has been approached regarding a Bill to ensure that domestic boilers are safe and not emitting gas into the atmosphere.

Hall space is needed so that we can set up stalls, so if you rent a hall for your meetings please let me have details.

2020 was supposed to be a Climate Change super year with an international conference planned in Glasgow, 196 countries planned to attend – cancelled of course! However we can continue the good work on the ground! More meetings are planned potentially in geographic areas, which would be great because it would enable

us to link up on projects and extend our reach.

Now's the time for WIs to vote!

As I am sure you know, the National Federation Annual Meeting takes place virtually on **Tuesday June 8**. Some of you may have booked on this as observers, and some of you are, in fact, delegates. This year, voting for or against the resolution is, of course, different. But hopefully you, through your WIs you can still make your wishes known.

Your WI will have been allocated a delegate and her name and email will be advised to your WI Secretary. All WIs get one vote, either for or against, but it is much more difficult to do this when we are not all meeting yet.

The deadline for WIs to cast their votes is **5 July**, so your WI will need to contact your delegate **before then** so that she has all her WIs votes to hand. Each WI now needs to work out how they will find out their members' wishes. If you would like to know more about the resolution, there will be a presentation at the Annual Meeting, and there is also plenty of information on MyWI. Here are some of the ways you might be able to

let your WI Secretary know which way you would like to vote -

During a zoom meeting, if you have them. You can use a voting tool, or a simple 'hands up' would do. Secretaries will need to note who does not attend these and contact them some other way.

Are you planning to have an out-door event in June? A good time to get the vote done!

Your Secretary might be happy to receive a call, text or E mail with your selection.

Whichever way your WI committee decides to do it I am sure you will hear fairly soon.

When I was a delegate who attended the meeting, the best thing was going to my link WIs to tell them about the meeting and what happened! There are some really good speakers at this year's meeting so hopefully, you will get some feedback too.

WI NEWS FROM AROUND DORSET

STOBOROUGH WI

Our Climate Change Journey

It's so easy to feel overwhelmed by the sheer enormity of information bombarding us about climate change, and yet it's such an important subject. At Stoborough WI we are thrilled that we have been able to get a new, local climate emergency group off the ground namely, *Sustainable Wareham*. The group aims to engage with the wider Wareham community, recruiting volunteers and supporters to help Wareham maintain its vibrancy for residents and tourists, and to help its business economy to operate sustainably. We are concentrating on five topics: Litter, Plastics, Ecotourism, Energy and Enhancing Nature, and actions have already begun. We are liaising with other groups, and indeed learning from each other. Where appropriate, we are joining existing initiatives, like litter picks, and investigating town centre recycling possibilities.

Within our WI, our successes so far may have been small in terms of the planet, but every little bit helps. Some things are not straightforward – using paper plates instead of plastic turned out not to be environmentally friendly as they're not recyclable, so we reverted to chinaware, metal cutlery and glasses, with grateful thanks to willing washers-up! We have collected unwanted bras, in whatever state, for the charity *Against Breast Cancer*, who receive £700 per tonne that goes towards UK breast cancer research, with the bras going via their textile recovery project to support small businesses in African countries. We have been able to persuade a local clothing shop to collect bras for us from the wider population, which means more money for research and hopefully increased footfall into the shop for the proprietor.

I represent our WI on the Purbeck Energy Group, and I am very keen to see how we can reduce our energy consumption. In this role, I have written to government ministers asking them to consider making solar panels on new builds compulsory, and to the NFU President to ask about increasing their involvement with renewable energy.

The NFU responded positively, and already 30% of their members report they have some solar on farm buildings. And it's good to know that Ann Jones, NFWI's Vice Chair, sits on the advisory board of the Energy and Climate Intelligence Unit think-tank.

Let's think about the legacy we want to leave for future generations. What do we want people to be saying about our generation in 50 years' time? All the more reason for all of us to do what we can, no matter how small. Finally, I leave you with this thought: *ignorance is bliss, but it's not sustainable!*
